

# Council encourages responsible dog ownership as winter draws in



As winter approaches, Great Yarmouth Borough Council is urging all pet owners to be responsible and ensure that they clean up after their dogs during the colder months.

Winter brings unique challenges to pet ownership, and one of them is dealing with pet waste. Nationally, winter evenings bring with them an increase in mess in streets and parks as negligent dog owners use the darkness to dodge clearing up canine doings.

Failure to clean up after pets can result in unsightly streets, unpleasant odours, and potential health hazards for children, pedestrians, and other animals.

Pet owners are encouraged to carry poo bags while walking their dogs, especially during winter walks and promptly clean up after their dog, ensuring that waste is properly disposed of in waste bins. It is also advisable to carry a torch.

Great Yarmouth Borough Council's Environmental Rangers want to remind people that the borough is covered by a Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) which includes a borough-wide offence of dog fouling on any land to which the public has access.

Anyone caught failing to clear up after their canine friends risks a fine of up to £1,000 – in addition to making the area less enjoyable for other people.

The Environmental Rangers are responsible for investigating reported incidents, following up on tip-offs and appealing for information to help target those who blight the environment with dog fouling.

Cllr Paul Wells, portfolio holder for Environment and Sustainability, Waste and Licensing, said: "Keeping our streets and parks clean is not only a matter of civic responsibility but also reflects our respect for one another and our environment. We want to ensure that all residents, including our beloved pets, can enjoy a safe and clean winter season."

"For those that do not comply, our Rangers will enforce the law wherever possible."

Residents are encouraged to report incidents of irresponsible pet owners who do not clean up after their dogs. Anyone who witnesses a dog fouling offence in the borough can report it to Environmental Health on 01493 846478 or environmentalrangers@greatyarmouth.gov.uk or via the Love Clean Streets?app.

Evidence that can help the Rangers act includes photographs, a description of the dog and person walking it, the location, date and time of the incident.

# A tale of two funerals

I had the misfortune to lose my first husband 53 years ago on the eve of our son's christening. In those days there was no option but to have a formal funeral and I found it to be an enormous strain, the chapel was packed with his friends and it was expected that there would be a wake after the ceremony. Luckily, I had a supportive family, who organised the whole event. In September 2024, after a 25 year relationship, I sadly lost my second husband, Pot. He had been ill for some years. His funeral preference, like mine, was for a Viking burial off the beach (sadly not allowed in law). Instead, I opted for a non-attended cremation. I had a lot of pressure from family to have a formal

attended event, but was resolute. Memoria notified me of the date and time slot of the funeral and we were able to celebrate his life and raise a glass at home. Friends and family who lived further afield were also able to do this at their chosen places.

There was no stress and I was surrounded by the best of friends and son. There will be a further celebration of his life later when some ashes will be scattered on his mother's grave.

Of the two funerals I found Pot's to be personal and intimate and would recommend it as a stress free option. I could not have coped with the strain or expense of organising something traditional and would have re-lived my first husband's passing.



# A ghostly tale for a dark evening Has the puzzle of the old man of Hopton finally been solved?

No doubt, many people from the village will be familiar with the tale of the old man of Hopton. For those who aren't, there have been many sightings over the years of a ghostly figure who appears out of the mists on the A47 near the church to startled motorists. Many describe seeing a shapeless figure wearing a long overcoat, with giant boots and a terrifying expression, but could the truth be far more benign and tell a tale of pluck, loyalty and determination?

One of the first descriptions of the old man appears in 1937, when a Mr J. Ling, then aged 66, was one evening cycling home to Great Yarmouth along the stretch of the A47 near the Hopton turnoff when he came across a "figure in the road crouching and waving his arms." As he got closer, the apparition appeared to melt away, but it certainly left Mr Ling badly shaken.

Fast forward to 1957, when Roger Hammersley of Lowestoft was driving on the same stretch of road on a dark, cold and wet night. He describes seeing a "figure of a man wearing large boots, a large fawn overcoat and a hat crossing the road." Again, as he approached, the figure seemed to melt away.

Another sighting was recorded in 1980, when Frank Colby of the British Transport Police was able to give a detailed description of the figure that he saw. Again, it was late at night, wet and foggy. As he was making his way around the roundabout, the headlights of his car picked out a figure through the mists. He described it as being "stocky in build and wearing a calf-length, shapeless garment. He was hunched over and wearing huge footwear ....which he was lifting up as he plodded across the road."

Now, consider the tragic tale of William Balls, the Hopton postman, who was found dead on January 2nd 1899. Balls had been the village postie for 22 years and knew everyone and every part of Hopton, like the back of his hand. By all accounts, Balls was a fairly frail man of deteriorating health, but he was also fiercely loyal and driven by duty. Although he lived in

Gorleston with his wife Angelina, he grew up in Hopton, his father still farmed there (his land was close to what is now the roundabout at the entrance to the village) and he did his 16 hour round unfailingly every day.

On 2nd January 1899, William Balls set out once more to complete his round. Christmas had been especially busy and his father described the load that he had to carry on his round as being "particularly heavy" over the festive period. Balls himself was in poor health, suffering from what would now in all likelihood be diagnosed as Tuberculosis, but at the time was described as a very heavy flu, bordering on pneumonia. Just days before, the doctor had pleaded with him to rest properly or he risked death. Balls was heard to say "What can I do? I must do my duty!"

We know that the loyal Hopton postman set out on his round at approximately 4.30 on the morning of 2nd January 1899. His colleagues who saw him on the day described him as appearing unusually preoccupied and quiet, but seemingly in good health. It is difficult to



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pinpoint the exact weather conditions for the date, but it is fair to say that with the proximity of the sea, it would be bitterly cold. We also know that there was up to a foot of snowfall along the eastern side of the country in the winter of 1899.

By 9.30 in the morning, the local postmaster was starting to receive complaints of mail not being delivered on time, highly unusual for the Hopton postman, so a search was begun. Tragically, the body of Balls was discovered face down in a pool of blood in one of his own father's fields, seemingly having succumbed to his illness and the conditions. He appeared to have been heading back for a rest or shelter at his father's farm, almost certainly knowing that he was in real trouble. Later, the coroner would conclude that Balls died from a ruptured blood vessel, brought on by illness, believed to be pneumonia at the time. One interesting detail is that several of the witnesses who saw Balls that morning, either alive or dead, described him as wearing a "full cape, stout boots and hat" in a forlorn attempt to try to protect himself from the weather.

Put all of this together and is it just possible that the old man of Hopton is in fact loyal postman William Balls and that the figure is actually him trying desperately to complete his final round before heading home to see his wife, who in a tragic twist was pregnant with a child that Balls would never meet? Truth, they say, is stranger than fiction, so I leave it to you to decide......

# **HOPTON-ON-SEA PARISH COUNCIL**

Minute of the Parish Council Meeting held on Monday 14 October 2024 commencing at 7.30pm at Hopton Village Hall, Station Road, Hopton-on-Sea NR31 9BE.

**Present:** Parish Cllrs: Jan Windsor-Luck (Chairman), Steve Ames, Keith Bradley, Yvonne Bradley, Kevin Lee, John Plaskett, John Tonks.

**Also present:** County/Borough Cllr. Carl Annison. Julie McNair, Officer of the Council and five members of the public.

The Chairman pointed out housekeeping matters.

- To receive apologies for absence. Cllrs. Sue Hacon and Pam Oakes.
- To receive declarations of interest in respect of items on the agenda and consider any requests for dispensation. There were none.
- Public Forum. No matters were raised.
- 4. To confirm the Minute of the Parish Council Meeting held 9 September 2024

It was proposed by Cllr. Ames and seconded by Cllr. Plaskett to approve the Minute. Agreed by majority vote.

5. To receive County and Borough Councillors' Reports.

County/Borough Cllr. Annison advised that the verges on the right-hand side of the Lowestoft Road, heading north, have been levelled by NCC. The area will be seeded and next spring it is likely that GYBC will incorporate that area into their cutting regime. The section of cycleway/footpath has also been cut back. Bollards are to be placed across the top of the road to prevent fly tipping and County Cllr. Annison has offered to pay for this work out of his highways budget. Warren Road residents contacted Cllr. Annison regarding a fallen tree near Cliff Cottages and it was cleared within a few hours. Tom Cox the new NCC Highways Engineer for Area 4 (covering Hopton) is now in post and meetings have taken place regarding a number of highways issues.

6. To consider the Clerk's reports.a) Correspondence.

Listing as previously circulated.

Matters reported to NCC or GYBC this month: Rats along Beach Road and on the beach, see item 13 below. Litter bins overflowing on the Recreation Ground (now emptied). No street lights working on Teulon Close.

### b) Planning applications:

06/24/0462/VCO Land east of Lowestoft Road 200 homes - amendment to reserved matters. Development Control Committee Hearing at the Town Hall. No objection by the Planning Committee.

06/24/0436/HH Tally Ho Hall Road Hopton on Sea. Two storey side extension. Replace existing roof tiles with new slate material. No objection by the Planning Committee.

06/24/0752/ESN re EIA Screening Opinion for full planning for development Links Road. See Agenda item 7 below.

Permissions Granted by GYBC: None Planning Permissions Refused by GYBC: None

c) Finance.

To agree October 2024 invoices for payment and bank reconciliation statement as at 30 September 2024.

Ten payments and three direct debits totalling £3,314.95 from the business current account. It was proposed by Cllr. Plaskett and seconded by Cllr. K. Bradley to approve the list of payments and bank reconciliation statement. Unanimously agreed.

 To consider planning application land south of Links Road and east of Lowestoft Road (Gorleston/Hopton) 06/24/0752/ESN re EIA Screening opinion for full planning application for the development of approximately 550 residential dwellings (C3) including 112 of these as individual care/retirement dwellings, community facilities and services, commercial, business and service units (Class E) or local community and learning (Class F) (c.375 m2) and associated landscaping, highway works and associated infrastructure.

This application is a screening opinion only. A full planning application is expected mid 2025. The main objections relate to congestion on the A47 roundabout and extra traffic using Links Road. When the full planning application is received, the Parish Council will be notified by GYBC. Cllr. Plaskett has met with a member of Rupert Lowe MP's office, and the MP is opposed to this proposed development. Meetings have also taken place with Borough Cllrs. Paul Wells and Emma Flaxman-Taylor.

 To consider questions to be raised at the Parish Liaison meeting with GYBC, Wednesday 30th October 2024, 6pm at the Town Hall. Parish Council questions to be submitted in writing by 21 October 2024.

One question raised in relation to the lack of maintenance cutting back overhanging trees and hedges on Dorking Road.

- To receive information and consider matters relating to the Millennium Garden/Ruin.
  - a) Response from Abate (now OCS). Bird proofing was completed and the Tower is fully netted. This work has been carried out free of charge.
  - b) Water tap/box.

The new box is in situ. The stand pipe/tap was leaking and urgent repairs have been carried out by a local person at a cost of £65. It was proposed by Cllr. Plaskett and

- seconded by Cllr. K. Bradley to ratify this cost. Unanimously agreed. [A new padlock has now been fixed to the water tap box].
- To receive information and consider matters relating to the Recreation Ground/Pavilion.
  - a) Defib monthly maintenance update. Monthly maintenance carried out by Cllr. Hacon.
  - b) Strimming front of Recreation Ground and tidying up the Laurel bushes completed.

Work has been finished by the contract gardener.

11. To receive and consider paperwork from NCC Parish Partnership Scheme 2025/26.

Paperwork has previously been circulated including a response from NCC Highways regarding SAM2 cameras and speed humps on Station Road, along with a brochure from Westcotec. The scheme is 50/50 funding. The criteria is limited with the deadline for applications 6 December 2024

Much discussion took place regarding speeding vehicles through the village and the use of SAM2 and other similar devices, some of which NCC will not approve. Cllr. Lee will take this further forward with NCC Highways. Matter carried forward to the November agenda.

- 12. To receive and consider updates from previous Minutes.
  - a) Installation of new play equipment St. Clair Court.

Installation by Creative Play has been completed and the play area is open. There have been many positive comments from the feed on Facebook. The swing seats are being changed shortly by Norse and the frame painted. It was noted that two entrance gates are missing and this will be investigated.

b) New bench at St. Clare Court play area.

Following a brief discussion, it was proposed by Cllr. Windsor-Luck and seconded by Cllr. K. Bradley that a small number of Cllrs. would visit the area to ascertain the best position for the new bench and report back. The existing bench to remain in situ.

13. Complaints regarding large numbers of rats on the beach, sea wall and Beach Road. Advice from OCS Pest Division. This is an ongoing problem and has been reported to the Parish Council on numerous occasions. OCS advise there is nothing they can do. A brief discussion took place regarding bait boxes. These would need to be checked on a daily basis. Cllr. Windsor-Luck will investigate the cost.

14. To receive and consider a report regarding CiLCA (Certificate in Local Council Administration) and GPC (General Power of Competence).
A report has been circulated to all Cllrs. Having read the report, it was felt there was no sense in pursuing. It was proposed by Cllr. Windsor-Luck and seconded by Cllr. Y. Bradley not to pursue CiLCA nor the

GPA. Agreed by majority vote.

- 15. To receive and consider a quotation from the contract gardener to cut back/strim the sides of Warren Road and cut back any overhanging branches. A quote has been obtained, however, a few residents have got together to cut back the pathway on Warren Road. This was noticed on the Facebook page and a vote of thanks given to Emma and Gary Smith, Paula Triggs and Valerie McGee.
- 16. To receive SNAP report.

Accepted as read. Thanks to Zandra Ward for taking part, and another resident of Hopton. The SNAP, Teams Meetings with Norfolk Constabulary, are open to everyone.

It was proposed by Cllr. Tonks and seconded by Cllr. Ames that the public and any press leave the meeting. Unanimously agreed.



### More on Military Activity in Hopton

Further to the article last month, readers have got in touch to add some additional context to the history of military activity in Hopton.

#### Soldiers on the Beach

Last month's article featured information about military activity in Hopton in the early days of the war. A reader has been in touch to supply two photographs which show a group of soldiers on the beach at Hopton some time in 1940. The majority appear to be involved in physical training, whilst in the second photo, some appear to be sitting in the foreground, perhaps receiving instruction. Barbed wire can be seen in the foreground of both photos.

#### **RAF Hopton**

Additional information has been received regarding the accommodation centre for the RAF. This was situated away from the radar station on Station Road. The photograph below was taken in 1974, over a decade after the RAF base closed and was replaced by the (by this time also defunct) Mariners

Holiday Park. Some of the derelict RAF buildings can be seen in the foreground. The village church and Station Road can be seen in the background. The chalets and other buildings were demolished to be replaced by housing.

#### **Memories of the Radar Station**

A local writer known as 'Peggoty' fondly remembers doing his National Service in Hopton in 1953-4. He recalls going to the actual radar site only once, and here he takes up the story "A friendly CO showed me around, and, against my better judgement, insisted we go up one of the towers and, despite my fear of heights, we ascended in a tiny lift cage.

As I emerged at the top, my head was nearly taken off by the rotating dish. "Sorry," apologised the CO, "I forgot to tell you to duck." I admired the views from the tower

and thankfully prepared to descend. Unfortunately, the lift was stuck at the top, but the CO said it was not worth phoning down for help because we could climb the open ladder!

When I repeated my vertigo fear, he retorted that I ought not to have joined the RAF if I did not like heights, so down we went. It was the most terrifying minutes of my young life as my sweaty hands gripped each rung and -despite advice- I looked down at the holidaymakers on the cliff path, their necks craned to watch those two apparent spidermen.

I survived but RAF Hopton did not and was bought by local property developer and businessman, Joe Larter, who turned it into a holiday camp named Mariners Park."

We are a non-profit club open on Friday evenings at the Village Hall during school term time, from 7pm until 9pm.



Describe yourself in five words.
 Blind, partially-deaf, sociable, crazy and a computer-

2. Can you say a little about why you chose those words?

I love helping people to get to grips with technology. I also enjoy sharing my story with others being blind and deaf, letting people know that it is no bad thing; one can easily adapt to the world, especially today with technology being a great help. In short, the sky is the limit!

3. Tell me a bit about a typical day in your life.

A typical day in my life is as follows: I rise at around 8:15am, start work at around 8:45am (this involves helping customers with technical problems via phone and email – I work for a company called HumanWare, specialising in products for the blind and visually impaired), have lunch at 12:00pm, back to work at 1:00pm, finish at 5:00pm then relax for the evening. I mostly relax at weekends, volunteering for a blind children's group showing them technology and gadgets I use every day to try to be a role-model to them and their parents. I also run a Tech Session once a month in Lowestoft Library to assist people with their technology. (Editor's note: There are details at the bottom of this article about the next session)

4. What's your favourite thing about the village? It's lovely and quiet. I can walk around safely here with my red and white cane (red is for the deaf). The sound of the sea is also a comforting backdrop. 5. What's important to you?

I enjoy helping people, particularly with Technology. I find it rewarding when I have managed to solve someone's problems or made them feel better. I also love sharing my experiences being deaf and blind with others, telling them that being so doesn't stop me doing what I wish to do.

6. Tell me a funny/strange/unexpected story involving something that has happened to you?

When I was around 10 years old, my father and I were at the local park where he was teaching me to ride my first bike. He would run next to me or behind me and call out instructions to stop if I got too near obstacles. One day, I was cycling along and he was running after me, shouting "Stop!" as I was nearly in the brook. I couldn't hear him, as the wind was blowing in my hearing aids and he only just caught me in time!

Finally, it only seems appropriate to give a shout-out for Lewis's tech sessions:
