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

An account from my Aunt's notebook: The

I had an old aunt, who was a great collector of things. She was renowned for her meticulous records of local life, including many accounts of the people she came into contact with. As I was helping to clear her cottage after she had passed away, I came across a notebook on one of her bookshelves. On the front page, In my aunt's own distinctive, meticulous hand, was written the following:

"This ledger contains a number of unusual and unexplained stories that have been shared with me over the years. Although I cannot verify their versimilitude myself, all, I consider, are from irrefutably reliable sources."

I have copied one such account from the notebook myself below. All I have changed are the names of people and places (the house for example), in case there are any descendants still in the locality.

My name is James Harrington. My grandfather was Edmund Harrington, he wanted to ensure that this account was recorded for those that followed him. He made me promise that I would share it with somebody I trust implicitly, so I shall.....

"I consider myself a man of science, but there is one event in my life for which I have no explanation. It concerns an unexpected inheritance when I was a much younger man. This is that story, you must make of it what you will.

I remember vividly the wind howling over the barren marshes of the Norfolk coast, carrying with it the sharp bite of sea spray. It was the dead of winter, and Marshfleet Manor stood like a shadowed sentinel against the storm-wracked sky. Built upon a rocky promontory overlooking the North Sea, the Manor was an austere edifice of grey stone, its jagged spires reaching skyward like skeletal fingers clawing at the heavens.

Inside, I was restless, and paced the dimly lit drawing room, the light of the roaring fire casting flickering shadows on the walls. I remember my leather boots creaking against the polished wooden floor, and I recall feeling very odd indeed, I was filled with unease. It was this place, I was sure of it. I had inherited the Manor two months prior upon the unexpected death of my uncle, Lord Marshfleet, and had arrived just that morning to take possession.

The storm outside had grown fiercer as dusk fell, and the howling wind now sounded almost like a voice, wailing through the cracks of the ancient Manor. I remember pausing by the window, and peering out into the tempest. Beyond the glass, the sea churned and frothed, its dark waves crashing violently against the rocks below. The sight filled me with a strange sense of foreboding.

"Will there be anything else tonight, sir?" asked Mrs. Wilkins, my inherited housekeeper, breaking the silence.

I turned, startled by her sudden appearance. She was a small, wiry woman with a perpetually worried expression, her grey hair pulled back in a tight bun. "No, thank you, Mrs. Wilkins. You may retire for the evening," I replied, trying to sound confident despite the unease coiling in my chest.

I remember, Mrs. Wilkins hesitated, glancing toward the window before speaking. "If I may, sir... there's an old tale about this Manor. Some say it's best to avoid the east wing after dark."

I raised an eyebrow, trying to look nonchalant. "The east wing? Why is that?"

The housekeeper shifted uncomfortably, wringing her hands. "They say it's haunted, sir. By the Wraith of Marshfleet. She was the lady of the Manor two centuries ago, driven mad by grief after losing her husband to the sea. They found her body at the foot of the cliffs one stormy night. Since then, her spirit is said to wander the east wing during storms, searching for her lost love."

I found myself chuckling, though it seemed to me a hollow sound. "A charming tale, Mrs. Wilkins, but I assure you, I don't believe in ghosts."

Mrs. Wilkins pursed her lips but said no more, nodding curtly before leaving the room. Alone once more, I tried to shake off the lingering unease her words had stirred. I poured myself a glass of brandy and settled into the armchair by the fire, determined to

dismiss such superstitions as the fanciful imaginings of rural folk.

Yet as the hours passed and the storm intensified, I found it increasingly difficult to ignore the strange noises echoing through the Manor. At first, I tried to attribute them to the wind—low moans and distant thuds, the creak of ancient wood shifting under pressure. But then came the footsteps.

Soft, deliberate, and unmistakable, they echoed faintly down the corridor outside the drawing room. I froze, my glass halfway to my lips. The sound stopped abruptly, leaving an oppressive silence in its wake. Gathering courage, I rose and took a candle from the mantelpiece, I knew what I must do to avoid being driven mad.

I recall that as I stepped into the corridor, the air seemed colder, the flickering candlelight barely penetrating the darkness. The footsteps resumed. fainter now, leading toward the east wing. I have always believed that I am a rational man, so I told myself it was likely Mrs. Wilkins or one of the servants, but my hands became clammy and my heart raced nonetheless.

The east wing was in a state of disrepair, its rooms unused and neglected since before my uncle's time. As I ventured deeper, the air grew colder still, and a faint, but most unpleasant scent of salt and decay filled my nostrils. The footsteps stopped once more, and I found myself standing before a heavy oak door at the end of the hall.

I don't mind telling you, I hesitated, the words of the housekeeper ringing loudly in my mind. The Wraith of Marshfleet... shaking my head to try to dismiss this ridiculous notion, I pushed the door open.

The room beyond was a grand bedchamber, its furnishings covered in dust and cobwebs. Heavy velvet curtains hung over the windows, stirring slightly despite the absence of any breeze. In the centre of the room stood a great four-poster bed, its canopy sagging with age. And then I saw her.

A figure stood by the window, her back to me. I can see her in my mind's eye now, as clear as if

she was standing here before me, she was dressed in a flowing white gown, her long dark hair cascading down her back in tangled waves. My breath caught in my throat.

"Who's there?" I demanded, hearing my voice shaking despite my best efforts to sound authoritative.

The figure did not respond, nor did she move. Summoning my courage, I stepped closer, the candlelight casting an eerie glow.

Finding my last vestiges of strength, I said "Madam, you are trespassing. Identify yourself,"

The figure turned slowly, and I recoiled in horror. Her face was pale and translucent, her eyes sunken and hollow. Her lips twisted into a mournful expression as she raised a hand toward me.

"Leave this place," she whispered, her voice barely audible over the howl of the storm.

As if given the most firm push, I staggered backward, the candle slipping from my grasp and extinguishing as it hit the floor. The room plunged into darkness, I scrambled to relight it, but when I finally managed to get my shaking hands to obey me, the figure was gone. Only the sound of the storm and my own ragged breathing remained.


As fast as my legs would carry me, I fled the east wing, gratefully bolting the door behind me as I returned to the drawing room. There, I poured myself another glass of brandy, my heart raced and my whole body trembled uncontrollably as I tried to make sense of what I had seen. A trick of the light? A dream? But no matter how much I tried to rationalise it I could not shake the feeling of icy dread that had gripped me in that room.

The storm raged on through the night, and sleep eluded me. As dawn broke, the wind subsided, leaving a fragile calm in its wake. I resolved to investigate the history of the Manor further, determined to uncover the truth about the Wraith of Marshfleet. Over the following days, I pored through my uncle's papers and the Manor's archives. What I discovered sent a chill through my very soul. The records confirmed Mrs. Wilkins's tale: Lady Eleanor Marshfleet had indeed thrown herself from the cliffs during a storm two centuries ago, her body never recovered. But there was more. I discovered that my own distant ancestor, William Harrington, had been her lover, accused of abandoning her for another. The scandal had been hushed up, and the Harrington family had fled the area soon after.

I was haunted by the realization that my presence at Marshfleet Manor might have awakened something long buried. Though I stayed for several more weeks, I was cautious and not at all my normal self. The wraith appeared to me only once more, standing silently at the cliffs' edge during another storm. This time, I did not approach, watching instead as she faded into the mist.

By the end of the winter, I resolved to abandon the Manor, leaving it to crumble beneath the relentless assault of time and tide. I could not live with the constant fear of coming into contact with the wraith and feeling anything but at home. I remained in correspondence with Mrs Wilkins until she passed away. She told me that the Wraith of Marshfleet still roamed the east wing during storms, her mournful cries mingling with the howling wind. On rare occasions, she told me, there are reports of a solitary figure in white at the cliffs' edge, gazing out to sea, not through guilt about her poor husband's death, but, in fact, forever searching for the lover that betrayed her."

Truth, they say, is stranger than fiction. My aunt was renowned for never embellishing the stories told to her, so could this one be true? I'll leave it to you to decide.


The Honesty Book Exchange Point

HOPTON-ON-SEA PARISH COUNCIL

Minute of the Parish Council Meeting held on Monday 9 December 2024 commencing at 7.30pm at Hopton Village Hall, Station Road, Hopton-on-Sea NR31 9BE.

Present: Parish Cllrs: Jan Windsor-Luck (Chairman), Sue Hacon (Vice-Chair arrived 7.35pm and gave apologies for being late), Steve Ames, Keith Bradley, Yvonne Bradley, Kevin Lee, John Plaskett.

Also present: Julie McNair, Officer of the Council and five members of the public.

The Chairman pointed out housekeeping matters.

- 1. To receive apologies for absence. Parish Cllrs. Pam Oakes and John Tonks. County/Borough Cllr. Carl Annison.
- 2. To receive declarations of interest in respect of items on the agenda and consider any requests for dispensation. There were none.
- 3. Public Forum. In summary:-

a) Could Hopton residents have a small indoor food waste bin, and possibly a larger one for outside? The Parish Council will make enquiries of Great Yarmouth Borough Council (GYBC).

4. To confirm the Minute of the Parish Council Meeting held 11 November 2024.

It was proposed by Cllr. Ames and seconded by Cllr. Lee to approve the Minute. Unanimously agreed.

5. To receive County and Borough Councillors' Reports.

County/Borough Cllr. Annison sent an email wishing everyone a Happy Christmas. He is unable to attend due to the GYBC civic carol service.

6. To consider the Clerk's reports. a) Correspondence. Listing as previously circulated. E-mail from GYBC regarding the 8 week public consultation on the Final Draft Local Plan and Draft Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Charging Schedule, commencing 6 December 2024 and closing 31 January 2025. This has been circulated, and Cllrs. Windsor-Luck, Hacon and Plaskett will be attending a briefing at the Town Hall on 17 December 2024. Regarding the Final Draft Local Plan, the proposed development areas are HOP1, Longfullans Lane. HOP2, Potters car park Coast Road. URB21 - Links Road south side.

Matters reported this month: Obscured 30mph sign reported to GYBC. Fallen tree branch end of Julian Way reported to GYBC. Faulty street light outside St. Margaret's Church (now repaired). A request has been received to litter pick Longfullans Lane now that the hedging has been cut back.

b) Planning applications:

06/24/0830/HH 16 Seaview Rise. Removal of conservatory and erection of single

storey extension. No objection by the Planning Committee.

06/24/0861/HH Farside Sidegate Road. Single storey rear extension with first floor terrace balcony above. Front porch extension. Erection of a detached garage in front garden. No objection by the Planning Committee.

Permissions Granted by GYBC: None

Planning Permissions Refused by GYBC:

None

c) Finance. To agree December 2024 invoices for payment and bank reconciliation statement as at 30 November 2024.

Five payments and two direct debits totalling £2,660.68 plus additional November payments totalling £617.61 as listed from the business current account. It was proposed by ClIr. K. Bradley and seconded by ClIr. Plaskett to approve the list of payments and bank reconciliation statement. Unanimously agreed.

7. To receive and consider information relating to .gov.uk domain for e-mails and website.

Several quotations have previously been circulated to all Parish ClIrs. Following a brief discussion, it was proposed by ClIr. Windsor-Luck and seconded by ClIr. Plaskett not to proceed at this time. Unanimously agreed.

8. To receive Minute of the Policies & Finance Advisory Committee meeting held 18 November 2024 and consider recommendations made in relation to budget/precept for 2025/26.

Following a brief discussion, it was proposed by ClIr. Ames not to increase the precept. This proposal was not seconded. In view of the increased tax base (number of homes in the village), it was proposed by ClIr. Lee and seconded by ClIr. Plaskett to increase the precept by 7%, which equates to £0.38p per year increase on a Band D property. Agreed by majority vote. It was proposed by ClIr. Plaskett and seconded by ClIr. Y. Bradley to approve the Minute of the Policies & Finance Advisory Committee meeting held 18 November 2024. Agreed by majority vote.

9. To receive information and consider matters relating to the Millennium Garden/Ruin.

a) Annual bonfire carried out. The annual bonfire to burn garden waste has been carried out.

10. To receive information and consider matters relating to the Recreation Ground/Pavilion.

a) Defib monthly maintenance update. Monthly maintenance carried out by Cllr. Y. Bradley.

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b) Licence Hopton Harriers FC.

The football team will be raising some enquiries regarding the Licence. Matter carried forward with the Recreation Ground Working Party.

11. To receive and consider updates from previous Minutes.

a) Installation of new bench at St. Clare Court. The concrete base/slabs are in place. The bench has been delivered and installed.

b) Parish Partnership Scheme 2025/26. Speeding vehicles. Working party. Due to time constraints and insufficient supporting data, the application has not been progressed. However, a Working Party is to be set up to look at safety aspects in the village and information from the Working Party, along with SAM2 data can be used to support a future application, or future spending on road safety. Members of the public put forward some helpful ideas. A call for a small number of residents to join the Working Party will be advertised in Village News magazine. Matter carried forward to a future meeting.

12. To consider replacing the damaged grit bin Seaview Rise.

Quotations have been circulated for a new grit bin at £129.99 (200 litre) and £199.99 (350 libre). Following a brief discussion, Cllr. Windsor-Luck will assess the damaged bin to see if it can be repaired or whether it needs replacing. Matter carried forward to the next meeting.

- **13.** To consider a candidate for co-option. It was proposed and seconded not to proceed with the co-option. A counterproposal was put forward and seconded to co-opt the candidate. Voting took place and it was agreed by majority vote not to co-opt the candidate at the present time.
- To confirm the date and time of the next meeting of Hopton-on-Sea Parish Council. Monday 13 January 2025, 7.30pm in the Village Hall. Confirmed. All residents are welcome to attend.

The meeting closed at approximately 8.10pm.

Essential gardening checklist for January

Flowers

- Plant bare-root roses, shrubs, hedging and ornamental trees, as long as the ground isn't frozen
- Take root cuttings of fleshy-rooted perennials such as oriental poppies, acanthus and verbascums
- Establish new colonies of snowdrops and hellebores by buying plants in flower, so you can choose the prettiest blooms
- Clear away soggy, collapsed stems of perennials and compost them
- Take hardwood cuttings from deciduous shrubs, such as forsythia, willow and viburnum
- Remove and bin hellebore foliage marked with black blotches, to limit the spread of leaf spot disease
- Press mistletoe berries into the bark of apple trees to establish your own mistletoe plants
- Check that small alpines don't become smothered by fallen leaves and other wind-blown debris
- Deadhead winter pansies and other bedding regularly, and remove any foliage affected by downy mildew
- Move deciduous shrubs that are in the wrong place to more suitable sites
- Check for rot on stored bulbs and tubers, and ensure dahlia and canna tubers haven't totally dried out
- Continue pruning climbing roses, while they are dormant

Fruit and veg

- Winter-prune apple and pear trees to remove any dead, damaged, congested and diseased branches
- Sort out your seeds, throwing away empty or outof-date packets and noting down any to buy for the coming season
- Plan this year's crop rotation to ensure you grow each type of crop in a different bed to previous years
- Prune gooseberries and redcurrants, cutting sideshoots back to three buds from their base
- Clear old crops and weeds from the veg plot, then dig over the soil, mixing in compost as you go
- Regularly inspect stored crops, discarding any showing signs of rot or deterioration
- Plant bare-root fruit trees and bushes into enriched soil, as long as the ground isn't frozen
- Ensure netting is in place over brassicas, such as kale, Brussels sprouts and cabbages, to protect from pigeons
- Cover rhubarb plants with a bucket or terracotta pot to force an early crop of tender long stems
- Feed spring cabbages with high-nitrogen feed to encourage leafy growth
- Prune blackcurrants, if you haven't done so already, removing about a quarter of the old stems
- Order seed potatoes, onions, shallots and garlic bulbs for planting in spring

We will be closed Friday 21st February for half term.


