GARDENING HINTS AND TIPS

Tools

The main thing is finding the right tool for you – that fits your grip, is balanced and in proportion to you. This is not necessarily the most expensive.

Essential toolkit:

- good secateurs
- a hoe one that works for you – the angle of the blade must be right and the handle the right length
- trowel
- border fork
- hand fork
- edging shears
- spade

Clothes

Whatever you're comfortable in, but also think about what you want to have with you in the garden – perhaps a holster with secateurs would be useful, or maybe wear cargo trousers with lots of pockets, or belts with attachments that you can carry things with.



NO SLUGS

Pests

Watch to see what's in your garden and plan in advance to stop them attacking. If, for example, you know that your garden has lots of slugs and snails, take a trip out at dusk to pick them off (don't wait until they've been eaten), or if you have lots of pigeons about, put up buzz lines and deterrents that will flap about to scare them off.



Planting

If you are planting anything make sure its well-watered before you take it out of the pot, and that the ground you are putting it in is well watered too.

Find the right plants for your soil – see what your neighbours are growing! If it looks good in their garden, it will work in yours too. The more time you spend in your garden, the more confident you'll get with what's growing there. Try to resist things that just won't grow in your soil, eg if you have alkaline soil, don't even attempt to grow rhododendrons.

Read the plant labels – the description of the plant and the conditions that they like – and match that up to your garden. The web is invaluable to helping you to find things out about specific plants.

Planning

Its good practice to carry a notebook into the garden with you for all those jobs you see and think you'll come back to, or to note something – eg the alliums are in the wrong place so I need to come back in the autumn to move them to a different place.

A notebook is also useful for planning – eg this combination of plants looks nice now, I'll do more of it in the future. The same goes for vegetables – this is what worked well this year so I should do it again. Noting sowing dates is useful too (for if it has or hasn't worked) to refer back to the following season.

Sometimes its worth just doing a job when you think of it (even if theoretically its not the best time for

it)! Otherwise it won't happen.

Take photos of your garden or allotment through the year because it gives you another perspective, but also gives you a reference for when you are planning your garden in the winter so you can see what worked, what should be moved, etc.

Timings and seasons – be instinctive as opposed to sowing on set dates, eg, if it still feels too cold and wet, don't sow yet! If you've never done it before then use books to guide you, but once you're more experienced, use your instinct.

At some point in the winter, sit and plan what you want to do and what you want to grow. It's a lovely activity that gives you optimism in the depths of winter. And spending winter evenings looking at seed catalogues, reference books and exploring plants on the internet is fun.

Magazines – find one that meets your needs and gives the kind of advice you need – for example does it give advice about sowing seeds, or garden design. Look out for things that come free with magazines, you might get something like a free seed sample of a plant that you might not think of buying yourself.

A gardening calendar is useful, and you can buy posters that are useful especially for seed sowing and vegetables. You often get these free with magazines too.

Be prepared for things not to work! Sometimes things fail. Be patient & have fun!

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

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Chairman's Annual Report 2023/24

I have now been Chair for 12 months and it has been a busy year for the Parish Council. One well-liked and very useful Councillor resigned, and three new Councillors came on board.

Minor repairs have been carried out to the Pavilion Building. It is good to see the recreation ground in use. The defibrillator on the external wall is maintained by the Parish Council.

Dog fouling has been on the increase once again. The voluntary dog wardens patrol the streets and report issues to GYBC Environmental Health. A campaign to stamp out this unhealthy, unsociable and irresponsible practise is on-going.

We have trimmed back some of the trees on the recreation ground and planted more laurel bushes along the front fence line. The car park barrier has

Another Councillor and I attended Great Yarmouth Borough Council, Development Control Committee meeting to raise concerns about the proposed changes to the Haven site. Comments in relation to GYBC's new draft local plan have been submitted and further consultations are due in April/May 2024 [the consultation has now been published in Village News, on website and can be found on GYBC website].

A new SAM2 camera bracket was installed on Links Road south side (being part of Hopton Parish), and the camera is now spending part of its time there as well as Station Road, Lowestoft Road, Sidegate Road

In May we presented pupils at Hopton CE Primary

academy with leather bookmarks to commemorate the crowning of King Charles 111 which was a

The Parish Council was pleased to financially support Party in the Park and Carols around the Ruin 2023.

The litter picking events are still ongoing and have been reasonably well attended, although we could always do with more volunteers. It is amazing how much rubbish we collect.

In August we held another skateboarding, BMX, scooter event. Despite delays which were out of our control, the event was well attended.

We are making slow progress with our application to use developers' money for the upgrade of St Clair Court play area. All the necessary quotations have been received and submitted in good time to Great Yarmouth Borough Council, who have now advised that no decision will be made until late spring.

The Christmas tree purchased last year for the Millennium Garden failed to survive, despite frequent watering. A temporary one was purchased and lit for the Christmas period 2023. A new tree has been donated and hopefully, will be a reasonable size in a

Although the unadopted pathway along Warren Road to Gorleston is not the responsibility of the Parish Council we have listened to the complaints regarding overgrowth at the sides, hedges and trees, and arranged for our contract gardener to cut these back where possible

The pigeon proofing at the tower in the Millennium Garden has been completed with new netting installed which does seem to be doing its job! The walls of the ruin are to be repaired in accordance with the advice of the Conservation Officer when the

We maintain the flower tubs throughout the village and if anyone would like to sponsor the boat in the Millennium Garden or the two tubs Station Road/ Anglian Way, please let us know.

A new biodiversity policy, with action plan, has been approved and will take shape over the coming

Village News magazine continues to be produced on a monthly basis and delivered to all homes in the Parish. If you would like to advertise, or have any suggestions for articles, please let us know. We continue to communicate with residents via the magazine, Hopton Residents Facebook and Nextdoor. Two of the noticeboards were repaired last summer

Thanks to our County and Borough Cllr. Carl Annison new updated flashing 20mph signs are soon to be installed outside the school on Coast Road.

Budgets are always tight. Due to increased general costs, and the diminishing funding from GYBC, the Parish Council has increased the Precept (the small part of your Council tax you pay to the Borough Council for Parish use) by £4.76 per year for a Band D property from April 2024. Other bands are proportionate.

Finally, a big thank you to all volunteers (including councillors) for donating their time and energy for the benefit of the village

The Honesty Book **Exchange Point**

There is an Honesty Book **Exchange Point in the Village Hall** for everyone to use. Bring in a paperback you have read, browse

Please remember to sanitise your hands before exchanging a book. No hardback books please, just paperbacks on exchange only. Please do not leave books without exchanging.

Three gripes!

t is nice to see that there are so many treasured pets in the village, but I have three gripes. The first is the amount of dog poo that is not picked up (it is part of the brief of pet ownership). The second is the misbelief that there is a dog poo bag fairy who picks bags off trees, out of bushes and from pavements and puts them in the bin. The fairy does not exist, so please dispose of bags responsibly either in a public litter bin or take the bag home and put it in your own bin. My final gripe concerns the use of retractable leads. These should be checked regularly for fraying and that the mechanism is working properly. They should not be used on public roads but kept for

recreation areas. If the dog is allowed to walk 4 feet in front of you, it can walk 4 feet across the road. I have seen so many near misses when dogs have gone into traffic. Also leads can 'jam' . If they are attached to a collar and the lead jams it can cause damage to the dog's neck. These leads have their uses as training aids and for allowing the animal more freedom in open spaces, but their use should be restricted and ideally 2 leads taken when walking (a traditional lead for trafficked areas and a retractable for open spaces.)

Minute of the Parish Council Meeting held on Monday 8 April 2024 commencing at 7.30pm at Hopton Village Hall, Station Road, Hopton-on-Sea NR31 9BE.

Present: Parish Cllrs: Jan Windsor-Luck (Chairman), Sue Hacon (Vice-Chairman), Steve Ames, Yvonne Bradley, Keith Bradley, Kevin Lee, Pam Oakes, John Plaskett, John

Also present: County/Borough Cllr. Carl Annison. Julie McNair, Officer of the Council and one member of the public.

The Chairman pointed out housekeeping matters

- 1. To receive apologies for absence. There were none.
- 2. To receive declarations of interest in respect of items on the agenda and consider any requests for dispensation. There were none.
- Public Forum.

Nothing raised.

4. To confirm the Minute of the Parish Council Meeting held 11 March 2024 and Minute of the extra ordinary Meeting held 22 March 2024.

It was proposed by Cllr. Ames and seconded by Cllr. Tonks to approve the Minute of 11 March 2024. This was unanimously agreed.

It was proposed by Cllr. Y. Bradley and seconded by Cllr. Oakes to approve the Minute of 22 March 2024. This was agreed by majority vote.

5. To receive County and Borough Councillors' Reports.

Cllr. Annison advised that progress has been made regarding the development of bungalows north Lowestoft Road. Top soil has been levelled out, a section of footpath topped out, the turning head at the end of the road is going to be topped out and finished on the 18th of this month. Cllr. Annison has asked Paul Sellick, NCC Highways for a site meeting to discuss exactly what further works need to be carried out. As a temporary measure, Cllr. Annison has asked the "hit squad" from GYBC to cut back the overgrown sides from Noel Close north to the A47 and tidy up verges. The situation is on-going.

- 6. To consider the Clerk's reports.
- a) Correspondence. Listing as previously
- b) Planning applications. There were
- c) Finance. To agree April 2024 invoices for payment and bank reconciliation statement as at 31 March 2024.

Eight payments and two direct debits totalling £3,918.29 from the business current account. It was proposed by Cllr. Plaskett and seconded by Cllr. K. Bradley to approve the bank reconciliation statement and April list of payments. This was unanimously agreed. The financial year end balance is £43,773.62. The Annual Governance and Accountability Return is with the internal auditor for checking.

- 7. To receive information and consider matters relating to the Millennium Garden/Ruin.
- a) Update following meeting with UK Power Networks on 2 April 2024.

Cllrs. Lee and Windsor-Luck met with UK Power Networks. A survey and schedule of works has been received. The quotation is £9,511.20 including VAT to install an electricity supply within the grounds of the Millennium Garden. There would be further costs in terms of architect's drawings and the purchase/installation of lighting. At this stage it is a feasibility study, exploring what is possible. Much discussion took place regarding the cost and potential pit-falls.

Cllr. Ames proposed that the Parish Council does not move forward with UK Power Networks, but to continue with an approach to the school/Diocese to see whether a separate metered supply could come off the school. The proposal was seconded by Cllr.

A counter-proposal was made by Cllr. Tonks to carry on researching with UK Power Networks and other organisations, and to bring all information to a future meeting. This proposal was not seconded.

Voting took place on the first proposal, five in favour, four opposed. Carried by majority

vote. Cllr. Lee will take this forward with the Diocese.

- 8. To receive information and consider matters relating to the Recreation Ground/Pavilion.
- a) Defib monthly maintenance update. March maintenance has been carried out by Cllr. Hacon. The defib is emergency ready on The Circuit. A spare set of pads are held by Heart 2 Heart.
- b) Talking Elm Tree Services re Oak Tree east side work.

There is a delay with GYBC dealing with the application for tree works.

c) Fire risk checklist and action plan Pavilion Building.

The action plan has been completed. There are five recommendations and Hopton Harriers will be carrying out the work, at their

Some discussion took place regarding the Parish Council's insurance and whether this covers storage of liquids and activities that are taking place within the building. It was proposed by Cllr. Ames that (i) a Fire Prevention Officer from the Fire Service be asked to attend the building and provide advice, which is free of charge, and (ii) the Clerk to produce a trading account, and establish the number of Hopton children that use the facilities. This proposal was seconded by Cllr. Oakes and unanimously agreed.

9. To receive information and consider **Councillor Refresher Training with** Norfolk Parish Training & Support, to be held on-line, 6 June 2024, 7pm to 9pm, at a cost of £40 per Councillor. Alternatively, full Council refresher training.

Some discussion took place regarding the benefit of full Council training. The cost for NPT&S to attend Hopton, for a 2.5 hour session, would be £295, which equates to £32.77 per attendee (9 Cllrs). Cllrs. Windsor-Luck, Hacon, Oakes, Y. Bradley, K. Bradley and Lee showed an interest. Any spare places could be offered to either Bradwell or Corton Parish Council for a fee to help with

It was proposed by Cllr. Windsor-Luck and seconded by Cllr. Lee to proceed with full Council training. The Clerk to circulate suggested dates/times. This was unanimously agreed. Cllr. Ames expressed an interest in attending the full day new Cllr. induction course on 22 May 2024.

- 10. To receive and consider updates from previous Minutes.
- a) Progress of plans for the 80th anniversary of D. Day 6 June 2024.

Organisation is progressing well. There will be a presentation at the school in the morning and at Ritson Lodge in the afternoon, where some school pupils will be present wearing their 1940s style tops, knitted by volunteers in the village. Afternoon tea will follow, which is being provided by Ritson Lodge. Further discussion took place, and Cllr. Lee will produce a written/power point presentation. If any residents have any artefacts or photos they would like to share please contact Cllr. Lee - details in Village News magazine.

b) Village litter pick 27 April 2024, meeting 10am Pavilion Building.

The event has been advertised in the April edition of Village News magazine, on the Parish Council's website, noticeboards and posters have been sent to the school. Details will be uploaded to Hopton Residents Facebook page shortly. There is a "lets play litter bingo" game for children (accompanied by a responsible adult).

c) Annual Parish Meeting 13 May 2024.

Details have been advertised in the April edition of Village News magazine, on the Parish Council's website and noticeboards, inviting groups, organisations and businesses in the village to submit a summary of their work throughout the year, or attend the meeting to carry out a brief presentation. As yet, no responses have been received. The Annual Parish Meeting will take place on Monday 13 May 2024 in the Village Hall, immediately after closure of the Annual Parish Council meeting which starts at 7.30pm.

11.To receive information regarding the new full draft Local Plan. Parish meeting at the Town Hall 10 April 2024. Public **Consultation Meetings.**

Details have been published in the April edition of Village News, on the Parish Council's website, noticeboards and Hopton Residents Facebook page. The pubic consultation runs until 8 May 2024. The consultation can be viewed at https:// localplan.great-yarmouth.gov.uk

There are two* proposed developments affecting Hopton. HOP1 relates to 50 sheltered homes/homes with care at land Longfulans Lane (south side). HOP2 relates to 40 homes and business use at land Coast Road (Potters Leisure overflow car park

*Note: The development south side of Links Road, reference URB19 in the draft Local Plan has been allocated to Gorleston by GYBC, despite the land being within Hopton's boundary.

There are a number of public meetings in the Borough and details can be found on their website above.

Cllrs. Windsor-Luck, Hacon and Plaskett will be attending the Parish meeting at the Town Hall on 10 April 2024. Questions will be raised regarding the National Planning Policy Framework, which altered last year, and the encroachment on green belt in relation to HO1.

All comments from residents and the Parish Council must be submitted to GYBC by the 8 May 2024.

12.To receive and consider information from GYBC relating to the proposed Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL), and consultation period.


