

There is a craft fayre on 14th September, and the Lite Bite lunches will resume on the first Sunday in the month on Sunday September 1st.



## Extract of a letter from a resident.

It has been drawn to my attention that there has been a big increase in dog ownership in the village. Some owners still allow their dogs to foul, refusing to clear up afterwards. We are coming up for the school summer holidays and children could be walking straight into mess, picking up germs.

From the Parish Council:

Dog fouling is on the increase in Hopton once again. There is a temptation for dog owners to allow their pets to foul and not clear up after them, or to clear up and then throw the bag in a hedge.

Great Yarmouth Borough Council's Environmental Ranger team would like to remind dog owners that the whole of Great Yarmouth borough,

including Hopton, is covered by a Public Space Protection Order - Dog Fouling. Failure to clear up after a dog has fouled can incur a

## fine of up to £1,000.

Please carry a dog bag or other means to pick up your dog's mess and take it home with you, or put your bag in any public waste bin in the village.

## HOPTON-ON-SEA PARISH COUNCIL

Minute of the Parish Council Meeting held on Monday 12 August 2024 commencing at 7.30pm at Hopton Village Hall, Station Road, Hopton-on-Sea NR31 9BE.

**Present:** Parish Cllrs: Jan Windsor-Luck (Chairman), Sue Hacon (Vice-Chairman), Steve Ames, Yvonne Bradley, Keith Bradley, Kevin Lee, Pam Oakes, John Tonks.

**Also present:** County/Borough Cllr. Carl Annison. Julie McNair, Officer of the Council and two members of the public.

The Chairman pointed out housekeeping matters

- To receive apologies for absence.
   Cllr. Plaskett.
- 2. To receive declarations of interest in respect of items on the agenda and consider any requests for dispensation. There were none.
- **3. Public Forum.** Nothing raised.
- 4. To confirm the Minute of the Parish Council Meeting held 8 July 2024.

It was proposed by Cllr. Tonks and seconded by Cllr. Y. Bradley to approve the Minute. Agreed by majority vote (due to Cllr. absence at last meeting).

## 5. To receive County and Borough Councillors' Reports.

County/Borough Cllr. Annison advised he has written to National Highways regarding the roundabout at Hopton as discussed at the last meeting. His suggestion of yellow strips across the road has been rejected by National Highways. They will continue to monitor that section of the A47.

Matters are still on-going regarding the issues on Lowestoft Road, north. A new Regional Manager has been appointed at NCC Highways and Cllr. Annison has asked for a meeting with him to discuss the outstanding matters.

Cllr. Annison has asked GYBC to arrange repairs to the Watsons Close play area as soon as possible (item 11 below refers).

- 6. To consider the Clerk's reports.
- **a) Correspondence.** Listing as previously circulated.
- b) Planning applications.

Application withdrawn - 06/21/0213/O Hybrid planning application seeking:

Full planning permission for construction of food retail store and associated infrastructure, electricity substation, drainage, two points of access from Links Road, parking and off-site highways works. Outline planning permission for up to 240 dwellings, a 60-bed housing-with-care scheme, associated infrastructure, drainage, and open space; comprising full details of vehicular access to Links Road, with all other details of layout, scale, appearance and landscaping reserved for future determination.

c) Finance. To agree August 2024 invoices for payment and bank reconciliation statement as at 31 July 2024.

Six payments and two direct debits totalling £2454.79 from the business current account. It was proposed by Cllr. Lee and seconded by Cllr. Oakes to approve the list of payments. Unanimously agreed. It was proposed by Cllr. Lee and seconded by Cllr. Tonks to approve the bank reconciliation statement. Unanimously agreed.

- 7. To receive information and consider matters relating to the Millennium Garden/Ruin.
- a) Outcome of talks with Diocese.

This is an on-going process

b) Response from Abate.

The job is being re-done by Abate at no cost to the Parish Council. The scaffold will go up again right to the roof line where they suspect a fixing has popped out due to the age of the mortar, allowing birds to freely ingress. They will change over the base canopy net to a smaller grade netting to prevent any possibility of pigeons flying hard into the net and getting stuck. The work is likely to start end of August/early September.

The water box in the Millennium Garden has been damaged beyond repair and the water tap is being used by someone (other than Parish Councillors/Gardener). The Contract Gardener has offered to build and fit a new box at a cost of 2 hours work i.e. £34.00. As this is an urgent/emergency matter, the Responsible Finance Officer/Clerk has given approval to go ahead. It was proposed by Cllr. Ames and seconded by Cllr. Hacon to ratify the approval. Unanimously agreed.

- 8. To receive information and consider matters relating to the Recreation Ground/Pavilion.
- a) Defib monthly maintenance update.

Monthly maintenance carried out by Cllr.

Tonks who advised that the box needs to be wiped down more frequently.

b) Working Party progress.

A meeting with Hopton Harriers FC has taken place. The Working Party met again on 8 August to progress. The matter will come back on the Agenda for full Parish Council approval at a future date.

c) Car park barrier.

The lower barrier has now been greased, thanks to C/B Cllr. Annison.

9. To consider increasing the production of Village News magazine from 1500 to 1650 copies to cover the whole of the new development, at an additional cost of £15 per month.

Following a brief discussion, it was proposed by Cllr. Windsor-Luck and seconded by Cllr. Tonks to increase production by 150 copies at a cost of £15 per month for the August and September editions. The Policies & Finance Advisory Committee will be meeting in September to re-evaluate the situation and report back to full Council.

## 10. To receive and consider paperwork from NCC Parish Partnership Scheme 2025/26.

Paperwork has previously been circulated. The scheme is 50/50 funding. The criteria is limited. The deadline for applications is 6 December 2024. Some suggestions were discussed briefly, including the possibility of a second SAM2 camera, a hand-held speed camera (minimum 6 volunteers required) and speed humps along Station Road. This matter will be carried forward to the September Agenda.

## 11. Notice of temporary closure of Watsons Close play area for repairs by GYBC.

GYBC advise there has been an accident in the play area and it has been temporarily closed for repairs. It has now been closed for a month and GYBC advise that they have not been able to carry out the repair yet due to the engineer's workload and annual leave. The Parish Council will continue to chase GYBC for repairs at the earliest opportunity. See also County/Borough Cllr. Annison's report at item 5 above.

12. To receive and consider updates from previous Minutes.

a) Overgrown cycle paths Lowestoft Road to A47.

Reports sent to GYBC 13 June and chased 27 June, reported again 23 July 2024. No action has been taken to strim the cycle paths (Hall Road to A47 and Lowestoft Road, north, to A47). The matter has been referred to County/Borough Cllr. Annison to progress.

## b) Overgrown tree branches near the bus stop Lowestoft Road.

Further investigation is needed as to ownership. Possibility of seeking advice from GYBC's Arboriculturist. Matter on-going.

c) New bench at St. Clair Court play area.

The preinstall survey for the new play equipment is due on 20 August, with installation to start on 9 September 2024.

Quotations for a recycled plastic bench and fixing into concrete previously distributed to all Cllrs. A bench with a back is thought preferable, in recycled plastic. The quote from Roger Chapman at  $\mathfrak{L}155$  is to lay a large slab base on a layer of concrete.

It was proposed by Cllr. Tonks and seconded by Cllr. Oakes to agree a budget of up to £850 to include bench, fixings and ground work. Unanimously agreed.

The exact location of the bench to be discussed once the new play equipment has been installed. The existing bench to remain in situ

## Foods that help reduce arthritis and inflammation

- Fatty fish, such as salmon, tuna, sardines and herring. Fish oil supplements are another option.
- Green leafy vegetables, such as spinach and broccoli, are rich in vitamins E and C which protect against inflammation and help join flexibility.
- Legumes like peas and beans, particularly black-eyed peas, black beans and kidney beans as they contain antioxidants, zinc and folic acid.
- Nuts which are high in monounsaturated fats and omega-3 fatty acids, especially walnuts hazelnuts, pistachios and almonds.
- Whole grains such as quinoa, wheat, oats and brown rice; these have more fibre and nutrients than refined grains.
- Berries, including fruits like raspberries, strawberries and blueberries with high rich levels of antioxidants which fight inflammation.
- Onions and garlic both contain antiinflammatory chemicals, which can reduce some types of arthritic pain while having immune boosting characteristics.
- Olive oil containing healthy monounsaturated fat and also oleocanthal which can reduce inflammation.
- Green tea with a natural antioxidant can help ease arthritis, whether enjoyed as a hot or cold beverage.
- Turmeric features often in curries. It has anti-inflammatory properties; the curcumin in it helps reduce swelling and inflammation in the body.

### Recipe - Super Food Avocado Summer Salad on Toast

- Dice 1 large ripe avocado, 2 tomatoes, 2oz celery, 2oz cucumber, 12 stoned olives, 1 red pepper, 2oz chopped spring onions, 1 green pepper.
- Flavour with pepper, turmeric and curry powder. Combine with olive oil and vinegar to taste.
- Lightly toast a slice of bread or a bread roll or a muffin.
- Dress the prepared salad on toast. Decorate with slices of cooked beetroot.
- Finish with chopped chives, fresh herbs of choice. Serve with crisps or cheese straws.

### Recipe - Indulgent Chocolate Cake with Ganache

100grams dark chocolate, 80ml hot milk, 150grams butter, 120grams sugar, 3 eggs, 120grams self raising flour, 30grams cocoa powder, ½ teaspoon of baking powder.

For the cake ganache. 100grams dark chocolate, 20grams butter. Melt together over hot water, mixing thoroughly.

Place the chocolate in a bowl with the hot milk to melt. In another bowl place the butter and sugar, stirring until dissolved. Gradually incorporate the eggs, mixing in well. Add the chocolate and milk mixture. Pour into a cake tin 20 x 8 x 7cm. Cover with parchment paper. Bake in the oven at 180 centigrade for 60 - 70 minutes. When cooked remove and set aside to cool. Pour over chocolate ganache.

## Part 4: Aftermath

In the previous chapter, we heard how the bruised and battered England Ladies, despite giving everything, had been knocked out of Copa' 71. Two of their number were now in plaster and several were nursing nasty injuries. However, that wasn't the end of the story ...

Yvonne explains "We had been such a hit with the Mexican people and press that they wanted us to stay on for the rest of the tournament, so we stayed for another two weeks, all paid for. We had become so popular with the Mexican people, that they still mobbed us wherever we went." By this time. Yvonne and seven of her teammates had visited the hospital. There were two of the squad in plaster, one with a broken foot and Yvonne with a leg fracture.

She explains "The Mexican team came to visit us in our hotel, they were lovely, there were no hard feelings at all and they lined up and signed our

There was a hastily arranged 5th and 6th place playoff game, but by this time, they were so short of fit players, England had to borrow several members of the Mexico squad just to field a team. Despite losing this match 3-2, one of the still fit English players, Janice Barton, scored two goals. Very few footballers in the world can say that they scored two goals in The Aztec Stadium

The final itself was played on the 5th September 1971 in front of somewhere between 110,000 and 112,500 fans. Denmark beat Mexico 3-0 and finally it was time to come home.

The England ladies arrived home at Gatwick to little in the way of a welcoming committee apart from a couple of photographers and the squad went their separate ways. There was some coverage in the British press, but it was rather predictable stuff, with the team described as "footballing beauties" and even a comment of "don't laugh, one day there might be a female Arsenal team. In fact, the press and the wider establishment in general were more interested in their injuries, rather than their actual achievements with headlines such as "Soccer Girls Limp Home to a Rumpus" and "Football Mayhem as Women are Hurt." The MP for Luton even got involved and pledged that he would go forth and investigate the

The press was good enough to quote Harry Batt's belief that this was just the start and one day women's football would be as big as the men's game. Yvonne speaks very warmly of Harry "he was just brilliant, he knew how to connect with people and football-wise he was brilliant too."

Sadly the Women's Football Association did not share in this view and they decided that because Harry had had the temerity to take a team to Copa '71 and to, in their (incorrect) view pass it off as an official FA England team, he and his wife June should be blacklisted and banned from ever being involved in any form of football again. Yvonne says "Harry was banned for life, it broke him and he was never the same again." Not satisfied with just that, The Chiltern Ladies, the team that Harry and June founded, had to be broken up and what's more, if the WFA found out that any Chiltern Valley players were applying to register with other clubs, they were banned for three months - unless they could prove they didn't realise they had broken WFA rules by travelling to Mexico with the Batts. This level of vindictiveness seems extraordinary

today, especially as Harry and June were such visionaries. They saw where the womens game could go and they hoped that the fledgling English women's football community would be able to learn so much from their experiences in Mexico. Harry and June simply wouldn't be stopped by pontification, establishment hierarchy, red tape and hesitancy and much like many other great pioneers, they and many of their players paid the

Yvonne, like many of her teammates, returned to an ordinary life. She married Keith and brought up a family in Luton where they lived for many years before retiring to Hopton. Yvonne didn't even kick a football again for many years. Harry returned to the buses and died in obscurity in 1985, aged 78. On her own part, Yvonne says "I have no regrets, only that I wish I was a bit older so that I could take in how big it really was."

### Epilogue

Over the years, there has been renewed interest in Copa '71, culminating in the fabulous documentary film of the same name (currently on iplayer and a brilliant watch) being released. In 2023, Harry & June Batt, and the British Independents (as they are now officially referred to) have been recognised for the pioneers they were with their own blue plaque, dedicated by, you guessed it, the

Members of the squad and Harry's son today.

Oh yes, and finally, many years later one of the squad actually went on to be the founder of Arsenal Ladies Football Team....don't laugh!
